

COMMERCIAL ROAD TRANSPORT - SCHOLARSHIPS

Please read these Terms and Conditions carefully to ensure your application is considered.

- This scholarship pays the fee for one of the following MITO programmes.
 - 1. Micro – credentials** (up to three are covered by the scholarship)
 - Heavy Combination Vehicle Loading Fundamentals (duration 4 weeks)
and/or
 - Driver Safety (duration 4 weeks)
and/or
 - Mass and Dimensions (duration 4 weeks)
 - 2. New Zealand Certificate in Commercial Road Transport – Transportation of Logs Level 4** (duration 11 months)
or
 - 3. New Zealand Certificate in Commercial Road Transport - Heavy Vehicle Operator Level 3** (duration 15 months)
- Please note the programme duration times above.
- The scholarship pays for a Programme commencing in 2024.
- The programme must be started within 2 months of the enrolment.
- The scholarship can be applied to any of the above MITO programmes if enrolled after 1 June 2024.
- Employers must allow learners time to complete the programme.
- The scholarship can only be awarded once per person and is not transferable to another person.
- The scholarship is not transferable to another place of employment should you change employer before the scholarship is completed, unless the new employer is within the same industry and they are willing to support you; and your previous employer and MITO both agree to the transfer.
- Scholarship will be cancelled if learner terminates the programme. MITO will invoice the employer for the full cost of the scholarship.
- The person receiving the scholarship must be a New Zealand citizen or resident.
- The scholarship will not be awarded to applicants who are already enrolled in this or any other qualification with MITO or any other tertiary provider.
- The person receiving must be working full-time in the transport and logistics industry.
- MITO can use scholarship recipient's photos for promotional purposes to help promote MITO training programmes and the scholarship programme.
